We come to Easter Sunday's celebration filled with the memory of the liturgies of the greatest week of the Church's year - liturgies which have spoken for themselves, as they invited us to relive in faith the great things God has done for us, coming to a great climax in

the Easter Vigil - captured in the words of St Paul read during the Vigil, 'As Christ was raised from the dead by the Father's glory, we too' are called 'to live a new life'.

The days after Easter have a remarkable atmosphere. The Church's mood is not one of exuberant triumph, but one of wonder and calm. Faith must come to terms with the new creation brought into existence by the Paschal Mystery. And it is impossible to forget the price that has been paid: the one who 'went about doing good' has died 'hanging on a tree'.

Though they proclaim realities which are

incomparable in their greatness and importance, the Church's liturgies do not strive to impress by creating effect. Only faith can fully appreciate the motivation that brought them into existence; they are a reflection of the Church's living response to what God has done for us. A group of people who have come through a great ordeal or an extraordinary experience will often find themselves in a mood of calm, reflection and gratitude. The liturgies of Easter Week have such a mood.

With Peter, in the first reading, we look back upon the gospel story that has led up to the great event in which we have been given to share. Peter recalls the ministry of

Jesus 'anointed with the Holy Spirit and with power' and his tragic death; and as a privileged witness he announces the Lord's resurrection, to be 'the judge of the living and the dead', the one witnessed to by 'all the prophets'.



With Paul, in the second reading, we look forward with a hope that has no bounds. The destiny which is ours through the power of the Saviour's resurrection invites us to 'look for the things that are in heaven', because the life we now have 'is hidden with Christ in God'.

In the gospel reading - the story of Peter and the beloved disciple running to the empty tomb - the Church of the Apostles acknowledges that faith does not come easily: only a generous openness to God will find faith in the Risen Lord. This openness is linked especially with a knowledge of God's

ways to be found in 'the teaching of scripture'.

The renewal of baptismal promises, which is customary at the Easter Day Mass, invites us to reflect upon the immense implications of our sharing in the Saviour's risen life, for the sake of the whole world.

# From Today's Reading

**First Reading:** Acts 10:34-43, Peter, filled with the Holy Spirit and a renewed sense of confidence, stands up boldly and retells the story of Jesus' public life and death and what it means to all mankind. We should read this passage every day of our lives and give thanks to God for His love, which made it possible.

**Responsorial Psalm 118:1-23,** is an important liturgical poem sung at the Jewish Seder or Passover Meal. It recalls how the Israelites implored the God of Israel for help during a time of suffering and how God came to their rescue. The Psalmist then goes on to offer praises of thanksgiving acknowledging God's benevolence.

**Second Reading:** Colossians 3:1-4, Paul is speaking about our Baptism being a form of spiritual death and resurrection where we die to all forms of sin and rise with Christ to a new life—the Christian life. Think of this as if you have just put on a new suit or dress. You don't go out and work in the garden or clean the garage in a new suit or dress. Instead, you want to be seen in some festive way, alive and joyful. The "Christian Way of Life" is special and we should protect it from the dirt and grime of sin. Credit: stclaretoseville.org

The report for insurance has been sent to the Archdiocese for re-submission; our Building Restoration Committee is working with the Archdiocese on this matter and hopefully we will be successful with this insurance claim.


The pews have been sanded, cleaned stained and refinished by a group of volunteers, saving us approx. \$25-\$30,000!



# Sunday of Divine Mercy

The Sunday after Easter continues to reflect the joy of Easter as it should, and we should not let it fade from our daily lives so easily. It is something to be nourished through prayer and meditation. The Death and Resurrection of Jesus Christ is the central theme and event of all Christianity, and the more we understand it, the more meaningful our life here on earth will be to ourselves and to others. Just listen to the readings and see how they tune into this concept.

**The First Reading is from the Acts of the Apostles (4:32-35).** In this passage we read that all the followers of Jesus, not just the apostles, were so enthusiastic about this "new way" of life that they lived in communities in order to share everything, both material and spiritual. This way they could help in nourishing and sharing their newfound spiritual life in Christ with each other. Because of this joy many others came to believe and "the Lord added to their number."

**The Responsorial Psalm (118:2-24)** is a continuation of the same Psalm from Easter Sunday. It is an important liturgical poem sung at the Jewish Seder or Passover Meal. It recalls how the Israelites implored the God of Israel to save them from slavery to the Egyptians and how God came to their rescue. The Psalmist then goes on to offer praises of thanksgiving acknowledging God's benevolence.

The Second Reading is from the First letter of John (5:1-6). This is a brief summary of the Christian life then and now. We should not think of Christ's Resurrection as something that happened 2000 years ago. Rather, we should be thinking about it on a daily basis as something that God does for us in every Mass that is offered on our behalf--not just those we attend, but all Masses. They are the greatest prayers of thanksgiving that one could offer for this sublime act of divine love.

**The Gospel Reading is from the Gospel of John (20:19-31).** Put yourself in this scene. It is the night of the Resurrection and Jesus appears in all His divine Glory before the apostles. Can you imagine the joy after the shock subsides? The apostles must have been bouncing all over the room. Then later, Thomas, who wasn't there, throws cold water on that first event when he learns about it by refusing to believe. It takes another appearance of Jesus to convince Thomas who then utters that great phrase of humility, *"My Lord and my God!"* 

To doubt as Thomas did is not wrong or sinful; however, to leave it there and do nothing about it is wrong. Sometimes God puts doubts into our head in order for us to get moving toward finding the truth through prayer or study or both. So we need to ask ourselves: are we sometimes like Thomas, having a difficult time in believing? If so, then what are we



going to do about it? Do not let doubts rob you of the joy that God wants all of us to have. Something to think about during your prayer time this week.






